The lands on which Pacific Contact took place was among and around the ancient village site of sxweyemel.

These spaces exist within a territory with a rich history full of human and ancient Creation stories that tie many people + communities to the lands + waters in this region. These delicate kinships are constantly adjusting to the colonial imprint of contemporary society, so we recognize and hold space for those intricate relations in this region.

We would like to acknowledge these communities who sit around this fire:

Kwantlen First Nation x^wməθk^wəýəm (Musqueam) qićəý (Katzie First Nation) kwikwəλəm (Kwikwetlem) Semiahmoo First Nation səlilwətaf(Tsleil-Waututh Nation) Skwxwū7mes (Squamish Nation) Stő:lő (Sto:lo Nation) the Qayqayt First Nation.

As well we would like to acknowledge the deep relationship with the Tsilhqot'in Nation and their ancestor Chief A-han, who is interred on the Massey Theatre and 8th and 8th Creative Spaces grounds.

As a place that tells stories, we hold space for the delicate conversations + relations as Indigenous communities revitalize + resurge not only their cultures + history but their inter-community relations and kinships. As well we recognize and acknowledge the existence of ancient stories, place names and traditional knowledge encoded into the lands + waters we occupy.

These spaces exist within həṅḍəmiṅəṁ language territory of the Halkomelem language groups.







BCTC is moving the location of Pacific Contact around BC each year. Please select your preferred locations or suggest one below:



Other Types of Workshops


BCTC is considering introducing theatre, dance and other workshops to delegates to give them an idea of the community engagement artists can offer alongside performances, is this something that interests you?

What would you like to see more of....

- Most conversations happened in the in-between breaks during the conference having ample time for these breaks is important for people to connect.
- More Short 5's. I think they are a great way to give more artists the opportunity to perform and for presenters to see more options.
- More time for colleague meetings (artists, agents, presenters, etc.). One hour went by very quickly.
 Perhaps have attendees submit items for discussion prior to the conference that can be added to an agenda.
- I would love to see a Karaoke or jam night as a social event.
- Contact Room needs to be significantly more promoted to the delegates ... the value as a 'resource'
 over and above showcasing artists only needs to be appreciated and explored. Possibly a hand out
 of artists being represented?
- Downtime / flexible use time
- Felt there was enough, or more than enough, of all of the mentioned elements.
- · Informal social events
- More showcases and Contact Room time. Presenters don't even look at you if you don't showcase, and most don't even show up for the showcases. How are they supposed to get to know them if they don't see the showcases and don't want to go to the Contact Room?
- Need to bring back the hospitality room each night for informal networking.
- Considering the One-to-ones, I would love to have those better organized and make sure we got proper networking from those.
- I'm assuming you mean more than what we already had this year, in which case, definitely not more showcases but of course, they are essential to the event, and I wouldn't want them to go away.
 Also, I'm less and less a fan of the contact room. I'd rather have more one-on-one meetings and less contact room time if it had to be a tradeoff.
- I thought the content of the conference was very good this year. What I found, though, is that because the conference was not held all within one hotel, there was no Hospitality suite, lobby or bar for an end-of-day time to relax and just meet with folks. No pressure of "work" but an opportunity to meet new folks in a less pressured way. I found this time that while there was some opportunity during the days to socialize, I found myself just looking for familiar folks and (being somewhat shy) not as comfortable in approaching new folks as in an off-work situation. This opportunity was also lost due to the shorter and less frequent shuttles.
- Soundwalk, recharge-related activities that happen outdoors or in a quiet space?
- Important to keep in mind when showcasing 50+ artists that not all will be getting work. Please keep this to less.
- Please focus more on the artists than the presenters.
